#### The Gray Blue Jay

##### *Song by Bryant Oden*

Long ago and far away  
There was a prince named Prince Ray  
And one day young Prince Ray  
Went outside to run and play  
Then Prince Ray saw a blue Jay  
That wasn't blue but gray.  
Young Prince Ray said, "Hey Blue Jay –  
Why aren't you blue why are you gray?"  
The gray blue jay said, "hey Prince Ray  
There's so many colors and they're all okay.  
It's nice to be different I'm glad that I'm gray  
Now would you like to play with a gray blue  
jay?"  
So Prince Ray and the gray blue jay

**Materials to Gather:****Dramatic Play:**

This week the color is gray. You might add a gray tablecloth to the toy table, with gray napkins. Maybe you have a gray purse or shoes your child can play with. Any gray doll clothes, be sure to set out to use. If you have an elephant statue, you might let it adorn the playhouse for the week, if it is not fragile.

**Blocks:**

Put plastic elephant toys in the blocks area. Encourage child to build a zoo or jungle and play with the elephant toys. If you bought both African and Indian elephants, help your child discover the differences between them. Let them “feed” the elephants in the block zoo. Add a blue paper shape for a watering pond.

**Music:**

**Projects:**An Elephant Hunt

Go on a hunt with your child. You can pretend to dress up, or really do put on big “jungle” hats, and carry cameras (some parents might allow their child to play with guns, some don’t. If you have a “tranquilizer gun”, it could go on the hunt, as well.) Then you look for anything that starts with the same beginning sound as “eh-eh-elephant”. You and your child might look for eggs, earth, easel, eight, elbow (macaroni), eleven, elf, emerald, eraser, exercise (equipment), eye, earring, ear, earphones (ear plugs), eggplant. If the “e” item is small enough, bring it back to the calendar area to display it for the week. If it is too big, plant an “E” sticker on it, and come back to it often.

Letter E poster: Draw a large E on a sheet of construction paper. Make it nearly as big as the paper. Collect egg shells, rinse and dry. Then slightly crush them. Let child glue bits of egg shell onto the E shape. If you have enough shells, let child make two copies of the same picture. One to display, one you will save, and ultimately make into your child’s own alphabet book. If you’d like to make this activity even fancier, go ahead and color the eggs before or after you crack them open. For directions on natural food dyes, visit <http://chemistry.about.com/od/holidayhowtos/a/eastereggdyes.htm> The colored egg shells make a pretty picture, but if you didn’t have time to collect egg shells, then let your child make a collage of eyes and ears cut from magazines to glue to the E shape instead.

Nine Counting Book:

Cut Ten ovals from colored construction paper – any colors. Collect forty-five stickers – elephants would be nice, but even forty-five stars would be okay. With your child, make a counting book. Let him or her peel off one sticker, put it on one page. Write the number one. You can make dots for your child to trace, or write it for your child if he is not ready for pencil and paper activities yet. On the next page, put two stickers and write a number 2, etc. Continue until the ninth page is done. On the cover, print the word’s “My Counting Book” – but substitute your child’s name for “my”. Let him decorate it as he wishes. All this week, let him “read” the book to you at calendar time. Have him count each of the stickers on each page. Save the book.

Expressions

Using a large mirror, you and your child look into it and make funny faces. Open your eyes wide, and make your mouth into an “O”. Pull

your lips far apart with two fingers. Squish your cheeks together like your face got stuck in the door of a bus. Tell your child that another word for how your face looks is “expression”. Help him practice saying it. If he doesn’t notice right away, tell him that “expression” starts just like “elephant.” It is an “E” word. Take a picture of your child’s funny faces, and print them off for later. Tape them to the calendar area, and practice the new word “Expression”.

### Elegant E’s

Set out glue, four craft sticks (popsicle sticks), glitter. Show child how to glue the sticks to make an E shape. Let him glue them, and sprinkle glitter over them. Allow to dry before displaying in the calendar area. Make several. You could put a refrigerator magnet on the back of one, and put it on your fridge.

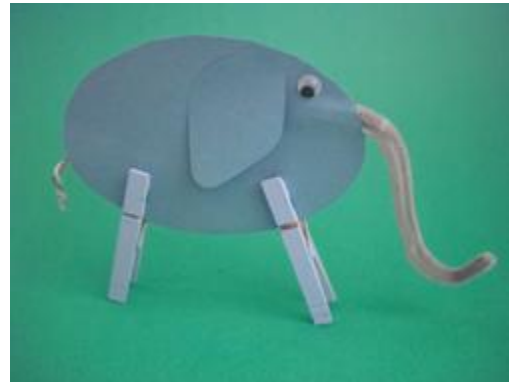
### Make scrambled eggs

One day, teach your child how to scramble eggs. Remind him that the stove is hot, and keep a close eye on him. Let him crack several eggs into a bowl. You’ll have to pick out the shell bits. You can measure some milk into a measuring cup, then let him add that to the eggs. Let him use a fork or whisk to stir the eggs. Add a bit of salt or seasonings. Then, preheat a steel pan. Immediately before adding the eggs, pour a little vegetable oil in the hot pan, add the eggs and begin stirring with a spatula. Eggs cook quickly, but make sure they are cooked. Raw eggs can carry disease. Serve with toast, or dye them green and serve with ham ☺.

### Emeralds

Color elbow macaroni bright green (same directions as for coloring rice.) Let dry. Then give child some yarn or string. Stiffen the tip of the yarn by painting it with glue and letting it dry, or wrapping it with masking tape. Tie a

large knot in one end to keep the pasta from slipping off. Let child string the Emerald Elbow pasta onto the string to make play jewelry. Tie the two ends together, and (optional) spray it with a shiny finish. Put in the dress-ups box. Teach your child the word “Emerald”, and that it is a precious green stone, and it starts with E.



### Elephant Craft

You will need to pre-cut the pieces, which makes this less about art, and more about following directions. But it is cute, anyway. Cut two large ovals from gray or light blue construction paper for the elephant body. Two smaller ovals for his ears. Use two pinch-type clothes pins for his legs, and you or your child can paint them gray or blue to match the ovals. You will need a gray or blue pipe cleaner for the nose, and a piece of gray or blue yarn for the tail, and some wiggly eyes. To assemble: Child bends the pipe cleaner in half and shapes it into a curly trunk. Put glue all around the edge of one large oval. Put the pipe cleaner at one end, and the short tail at the other end, then lay the second oval on top and press together. Glue on eyes and ears, then pinch the clothes pins onto the bottom edge for legs. All done! (This craft and picture are taken from Busy Bee Kids Crafts.)

Hand Print Elephant

Dip child's hand in gray paint, and press it to white construction paper. Turn hand around so fingers become elephant legs, and the thumb is the trunk. Cut an oval from gray paper for an ear. Add an eye –either glue on a wiggly eye, or cut a small black dot, or draw it with marker after the paint has dried. Add a bit of a tail, and the elephant is done! You can add "E is for Elephant" to the picture, if you wish. (Craft and picture from Busy Bee Kids Crafts).

Feed the Elephant

Color a picture of an elephant and tape it to the side of a box. Let child toss peanuts into the box. If you spread a sheet under the box, clean up will be easier. Simply pick up the sheet and

shake it into the box. Encourage the child to taste the peanuts (If you are sure your child is not peanut allergic!). Be careful if doing this in a preschool setting, as peanut allergies are almost epidemic. If your child can eat peanut butter, he can eat peanuts.

Backyard Safari

Set up a tent – toy or real. Set out toy binoculars. Wear shorts and boots and a hat. Hike through the backyard looking for imaginary wild animals. How many can you find? Where will you put them? What will you feed them? Let them all go at the end of play.

Egg Game

You will need several small items that start with the E sound, and a few that don't, and a bunch of empty plastic Easter eggs. Items may include earring, tiny elephant, evergreen twig, erasers, picture of ear, or earmuffs, picture of eyes, etc. Hide the items inside the eggs and put them in a basket. To play the game, the child takes an egg, opens it, and tells you if the item begins with the E sound.
